Dear Residents,

As we look ahead to spring, I am pleased to share updates on our initiatives and the steps we are taking to ensure a strong, vibrant, and sustainable future for our township.

Investing in Infrastructure

A well-maintained township is essential to our quality of life. This year, we are advancing key projects, including the new Recreation Complex, intersection upgrades on Route 300, a roundabout at Limoges Road and Notre-Dame Street (Coin Carotte), new traffic signals, and safety improvements in Russell Village.

We are also launching a multi-year infrastructure project on Notre-Dame Street, ensuring our roads and essential services keep pace with growth. Regular updates are available through our official channels.

Strengthening Our Local Economy

A strong economy creates jobs, enhances services, and helps balance the tax base. To encourage investment in the village core and commercial sectors of Embrun and Russell Villages, we have enhanced the Community Improvement Plan (CIP) with incentives that support local businesses—helping reduce reliance on residential

We are also creating a new Economic and Community Development Strategic Plan to grow key sectors like tourism, agriculture, healthcare, agri-food, and retail, ensuring a resilient economy while fostering a connected, thriving community.

Responsible Growth and Fiscal Stewardship

We remain committed to preserving what makes our Township special while planning for the future. To date, we have secured nearly \$8 million in grants for infrastructure projects and are actively pursuing additional funding to support sustainable development and ease the tax burden on residents.

Preserving Our Small-Town Charm

Our greatest strength is our people. To support community well-being, we have created a new Community Development Officer position to strengthen social connections.

I encourage everyone to get involved—whether by volunteering, attending community events, or supporting local groups. Every effort, big or small, helps keep our township thriving.

The Power of Collaboration

A great example of our community spirit is the partnership between Embrun Co-op, the Library Board, and the Township to establish a new purpose-built Embrun library branch, set to open in 2026. This project demonstrates what we can achieve when we work together toward a shared vision.

As we move forward, Council remains committed to ensuring the Township grows responsibly, respects our values, and strengthens our economy and quality of life.





Am I Eligible for a Lottery Licence?

Lottery licences are available for eligible not-for-profit organizations. They are not available for private functions or individuals fundraising for personal reasons, even if the funds raised are intended for charity.

The Township of Russell can provide eligible charities and not-for-profit organizations with lottery licences for the following types of lotteries: Bazaar, Break Open Tickets, Bingo, Catch the Ace, and Raffle.

Please note that the updated Licence Fee, effective January 1, 2025, is 3% of total proposed prize. Minimum fee per application is \$50. For more information, contact the Clerk's Office at clerk.greffe@russell.ca.
